"Health Literacy empowers, drives equity and must be an integral part of the skills, and competencies developed over a lifetime, first and foremost through the school curriculum." (WHO, 2017)

No tool measuring Health literacy by 8to11-year-old children validated in French.

This study aimed to:



This measure of children's health literacy is subjective.


SAMPLE AND DATA COLLECTION

74 elementary schools Between october 2019 and March 2020








VALIDATION OF THE SCALE



INTERNAL CONSISTENCY

- Cronbach's alpha = 0.83
- Revelle's Omega = 0.85

Average split-half reliability = 0.83

INTERNAL VALIDITY

EXTERNAL

VALIDITY: CFA

- Barlett's test of specificity: χ²(105) = 6996.3, p< 0.001
- KMO-criterion = 0.91
- Scree plot :
 - 3-factor model possible
- 2-factor model to keep eigenvalue > 1
- 2-factor model :

explained variance = 28%

- Factors 1: eigenvalues = 2.45, explained variance = 58%
- Factor 2 : eigenvalues = 1.79, explained variance = 42%
- Perceived self-efficacy (3 items) regressed on 12-item health literacy scale Standard estimates = [0.47 - 0.59] for Healthcare
 - factor's items Standard estimates = [0.52 - 0.56] for Primary
- prevention factor's items Standard estimates = [0.50 - 0.59] for PSE related
- Covariances' estimations with perceived self-efficacy
- 0.42 for the entire 12-item scale
- 0.36 for the Healthcare factor
- 0.38 for the Primary prevention factor pvalues p < 0.001
- Significant and moderate statistical relationship between health literacy and perceived self-efficacy

COMPLEMENTARY ANALYSES

FAS-III

FAS middle group vs FAS 20% inf. : no significant increase in mean HLS-Child-Q15 score (p-value = 0.12) FAS 20% inf. Vs FAS 20% sup. : significant increase in mean HLS-Child-Q15 score (p-value < 0.001)

Contextual data

No difference between urban vs. rural

No sign difference between public vs. private schools

Sex

Boys vs. girls : significant decrease in mean HLS-Child-Q15 score (p-value < 0.01)

Age

Significant increase (p-value = 0.02) of mean HLS-Child-Q15 score in age (0.05 per year)

CONCLUSION

Statistics showed a high internal consistency. The exploratory factor analysis suggested a twodimensional thematic scale related to healthcare and primary prevention. Several indicators also suggested that the scale could be reduced to 12 items.
